John Michael Green was born in Indiana in the United States of America in 1977. John has often spoken about how he was bullied as a teenager and how it made him feel miserable. John was planning to become a priest, but his experiences while working in a children's hospital inspired him to become an author.

John's first novel was a story about teen romance entitled Looking for Alaska, which made it to The New York Times Best Seller list for children's books. John is best known for his fifth novel, The Fault in Our Stars, which was recently made into a film. He personally signed the first 150 000 copies of the book (He must have had blisters on his fingers after that!).

John also creates online educational videos to teach about literature, history and science, and to support charity work. For those of you who are football fans, you'll be interested to know that John is a Liverpool FC supporter.



Thomas Michael Bond was born in England in 1926. He was unhappy at school, because the teachers would discipline the learners by beating them with rubber straps, and he left school at the age of fourteen.


Michael's first book was titled A Bear Called Paddington. The story is about a bear who is found at Paddington Railway Station by the Brown family. They adopt him and name him after the railway station. Michael then started writing full time and wrote more about The Adventures of Paddington Bear. People loved the stories so much that the Paddington Bear series sold more than 35 million books.

Michael was awarded the Order of the British Empire medal for his contribution to children's literature. In 2014, the story of Paddington Bear was made into a film called *Paddington*, in which the author plays a small part.

Jules Gabriel Verne was born in France in 1828, and is famous for his adventure and science fiction stories. His father wanted him to be a lawyer, but Jules loved writing and decided to make that his career instead. He wrote a letter to his father, saying, "Am I not right to follow my instincts? It's because I know who I am that I realise what I can be one day."

Jules wrote plays, poetry and novels in French, and he has been one of the most translated authors in the world. His most famous novels include Journey to the Centre of the Earth, Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea and Around the World In Eighty Days, all of which have been made into films.

Many places in France have been named after Jules, including a restaurant in the Eiffel Tower, a museum and an express train. A crater on the moon also bears his name, as well as two French ships, a university, a school and a spacecraft.



## PROFESOR TODOS SCIENCE

Have you ever heard of a naked egg? A naked egg is an egg without a shell. We're not talking about a boiled egg that has been peeled, but a raw egg without a shell. You would think that a raw egg would fall apart without its shell, but we will show you how to remove the shell while the inside of the egg remains intact.

### MAKE A NAKED E66!

#### YOU WILL NEED

- · One or two raw eggs
- A large glass, cup or jar
- White vinegar (or dark vinegar, but you can see better with white vinegar)

#### INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Carefully place the egg in the glass.
- 2. Pour the vinegar into the glass so that it completely covers the egg.
- 3. Now watch what happens over the next two days.

#### RESULTS AFTER A SHORT WHILE

In a short while you should see tiny bubbles forming on the egg shell. This is carbon-dioxide gas. Why? Well, the egg shell is made up mostly of something called calcium carbonate, which is found in many types of rock (like limestone, chalk and marble) and in the shells of snails, oysters and so on.

Vinegar contains an acid, called acetic acid. When the calcium carbonate in the egg shell and the acid in the vinegar come together, something happens – we call it a chemical reaction. The acid slowly dissolves the egg shell and carbon-dioxide gas is released (the little bubbles you see on the shell).

#### AFTER ONE DAY

After the first day, a lot of the egg shell will have been dissolved. You should be able to remove the egg from the vinegar without breaking the egg. The best way is to carefully pour out the vinegar and gently catch the egg in your hand. The inside of the egg is held together by the two fragile membranes that surround the white of the egg, just inside the shell. Try not to break the egg! Now pour fresh vinegar into the glass and let the egg soak for another day.

#### AFTER ANOTHER DAY

By now you should have a really cool naked egg. Remove it from the vinegar and you'll notice that it feels soft and a bit rubbery. You can even try to experiment with how much pressure the naked egg can take before it breaks.

You also might notice that the egg is a little bit bigger than it was when you first started. That is because some of the vinegar (and the water in the vinegar) has moved through the membranes into the egg.

If you want your naked egg to get even bigger, try soaking it in water. The water will move through the membranes and into the egg. The egg will swell and become larger. When water moves through a membrane, we call the process osmosis. If you add some food colouring to the water, then you'll see the same colour inside the egg after the water has moved inside!

And hey, we do not recommend eating naked eggs.
